What a year it's been! Some of our 2020 Achievements:

- **Transfer** of The Nature Conservancy's Nesika Beach Preserve to WRLT including 70 acres of conservation easements and fee land, with stewardship and legal defense funds.
- In process Closing on additional easement associated with the Nesika Beach Preserve. bringing the total land protection to 100 acres.
- **Gifted** A small parcel of forested land on the shores of Coos Bay from South Coast Land Conservancy. We are pleased that the Land Trust will be able to satisfy the original owner's intent to protect the donated land from development.
- Mapping tool Resilient Landscapes Initiative, funded by Doris Duke Charitable Fund and Oregon Community Foundation, supported development a state-of-the-art climate mapping tool allowing us to prioritize projects that build climate resiliency into the watersheds of the South Coast.
- **Closing soon** A conservation easement up Grizzly Mountain Road east of Gold Beach. Forests abut BLM land with known marbled murrelet nesting sites and wildlife - just a few miles as a raven flies to the Signal Buttes easement, adding connectivity and resiliency to that area overall.
- **Up next in 2021** Fundraising for stewardship and legal defense funds for donated property on the Millacoma River adjacent to Elliott State Forest.
